Helena Almeida: born in 1934 in Portugal; graduated in painting but progressively inhabited her work, using her own body while abolishing disciplinary frontiers. Almeida is always in front of the camera but insists that her works are not self-portraits. Her work is related to the architecture of her studio, a place that belonged to her father, the sculptor Leopoldo Almeida - and this has been concomitantly stage and the protagonist of her photographs.
